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## Objects Brought from Home

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#### Snack

Since your child does not eat lunch until 12:20pm, you may send a healthy snack for him/her to eat in the morning. We would like to promote a healthy lifestyle, so your help with this would be greatly appreciated! © Examples of healthy snacks include fruit, vegetables, crackers, pretzels, graham crackers, snack mixes, granola bars, and cheese. Please use your best judgment when sending a snack (I always follow the rule "no sugar in the first 3 ingredients" when I send my son's snack with him to school). If you are going to send something that requires a spoon/fork to eat, please provide the utensil. Even though the following snacks are healthy, they may be a distraction to learning so I ask that you DO NOT send them: unpeeled oranges, chips, and Gogarts (yogurt in a tube).

We are a **NUT FREE** classroom. There are children who are allergic to nuts, so please do not send in nuts or foods with nuts as an ingredient.

#### Water Bottles

We would like each child to bring in a water bottle each day to hydrate our brains so we are ready for learning. Your children will bring the bottle home everyday to be washed.

#### Objects Brought from Home

Please help your child remember to leave toys, games, electronics, and other personal items at home. I have seen many beloved toys and other special items lost of broken when they were brought to school. Also, please remind your child that weapons of any kind, even toys, are strictly forbidden. If I ask your child to bring in something special, I will send a note.

#### Birthdays

Everyone loves to celebrate in school! Please send me a note or an email in advance of the big day to tell me what you would like to send. If you send a sweet treat, please remember that it must be cupcakes, individual cookies, or individual ice cream treats. Cakes that need to be cut apart or ice cream that needs to be scooped are **very** inconvenient. Please also remember to send napkins. Summer birthdays are celebrated the last week of school. Some families prefer to send a new book for the class in lieu of an edible treat. We always love to increase our book collection!

#### Notes from Home

If you need to send me a message of some kind, you may send a note, write in your child's planner, call the school (333-5060) and leave a message, or email me at wever\_mk@elps.us. Generally, email is the best way to reach me during the day.

#### Volunteers

We will need help in and outside the classroom both on a regular and an occasional basis. Duties may include working with small groups or individuals, helping collate, secretarial tasks, housekeeping tasks, helping with field trips and parties, etc. We will need a few parents to volunteer to pick up water at Foods for Living. If you are interested in helping out, please send me an email.

ELPS is requires all volunteers to fill out a background check form. This is to keep the children in our school safe. Please fill out this form before volunteering to work in our classroom.

#### Homework

The most important thing your child can do at home is **READ!** Please help your child to get in a routine of reading for at least **20 minutes each night**. In addition, your child will bring home his/her binder each night with math homework. This homework will be given each night to compliment the math lesson done during the school day. It is **ALWAYS** due the next day. If there is other homework, you will find it in that same binder and written in the planner. Our job as 4th grade teachers is to prepare your children for 5th/6th grades. Therefore, we will be diligent in checking homework and planners with the goal of having your child become independent and organized. **Your child will be asking you to check over and sign his/her homework and planner every night.** 

Students who do not have their math facts committed to memory need to practice their facts every night so they become automatic. If you think your child needs more work at home, please visit the **Useful Websites** page of our classroom website, practice spelling words by making flash cards, write in a home journal, practice math facts, or increase how much your child READS.

#### Math Facts

It is expected that each child knows his/her math facts (addition, subtraction, multiplication, and division). Facts should be committed to memory and automatic. As our math curriculum gets more intense, the ability to recall facts automatically is imperative. Your child will bring home Fact Triangles. Please make sure to study facts every night to become automatic.

### Academics

#### Reading

Our district implemented a new reading program this year called **Reading Street**. There are whole group and small group lessons on vocabulary, grammar, comprehension, fluency, and accuracy. Students will be put into flexible instructional groups based on individual needs. Children work in these groups during our **Reader's Workshop** period when the rest of the class chooses to do an activity from **The Daily 5** (Read to Self, Partner Read, Write, Word Work, or Listen to Reading). Research suggests that the amount of independent reading time children do in school is related to gains in reading achievement. Independent reading is also a major source of vocabulary growth and reading fluency.

A balanced reading program with quality instruction involves many elements. In the Reader's Workshop, students have the opportunity to:

- Listen and respond to good literature.
- Participate in individual and small group instruction and read individually and/or with other children.
- Select material at the appropriate level.
- Have lessons on phonics and word attack skills.
- Focus on comprehension.
- Integrate reading and writing activities.

I believe that the ultimate goal of reading is personal understanding and enjoyment. Within Reader's Workshop, I will watch students display these characteristics everyday. They will be truly motivated to read (and read well).

You, as parents, are essential teachers in your child's reading development. You will support your child by listening to him/her read at home, continuing to read to and with your child, and making sure that the take-a-book-home program gets done successfully (more on that program later).

#### Writing

We write daily. Red Cedar has made a commitment to school-wide participation in the Writing Workshop format originated by the nationally renowned teacher, **Lucy Calkins**. Since the ability to write is so closely linked to success in all academic areas, we devote appropriate time to develop this important skill.

#### Spelling

We will be working with the **Reading Street** spelling program. This program focuses on correctly spelling high frequency words within context. In addition, each child has his/her own **Spelling Dictionary** that is used to promote proper spelling of the words that your child uses within his/her individual writing.

#### Mathematics

We will be working with the **Everyday Mathematics** program. Please be sure to read the Family Letters for information and answers to your child's homework (Family Letters are kept in the left side of your child's Daily Folder). This program was developed by the University of Chicago Mathematics Project to "enable children in the elementary grades to learn more mathematical content and become life-long mathematical thinkers."

#### Science

We have five major units. These include the **Changing Earth**, **View of Earth**, **Energy Transfer**, **Matter**, **and Ecology**.

#### Social Studies

We work on various units relating to Civics, Government, Economics, and Geography. We will also be working with the Michigan Model Health Curriculum.

#### MEAP

Fourth graders take the reading, math, and writing MEAP assessments in October. More information about dates will be coming home soon. Please make sure that your child is at school every day that the MEAP is scheduled. Try not to schedule doctor appointments during that time. This can be a very stressful time for kids, so it is helpful for your child to get plenty of rest and eat a good breakfast.

#### Book Bingo

Please put **Friday**, **March 1**, **2013** on your calendar now. As part of our Economics unit, your child will help plan and run Book Bingo (a huge book recycling night where we sell pizza and play Bingo to win books). The proceeds earned from Book Bingo go directly to help pay for our field trip to Hoffmaster State Park (the sand dunes) and Meijer Gardens. This is usually a very expensive field trip, so the money earned at Book Bingo helps offset the cost. In addition, it is an extremely fun night that teaches the concepts of owning and running a business.
